Early Childhood Iowa History: State and Local

State History:

lowa's Community Empowerment was established during the 1998 legislative session in an effort to create a partnership between communities and State government with an emphasis to improve the well-being of families with young children. Within local empowerment areas, local citizens were able to lead collaborative efforts involving education, health and human service programs.

The 2010 legislative session brought about some changes in Iowa's early childhood structure. Prior to this legislative session, Iowa's youngest children were served through a partnership between Community Empowerment and the Early Childhood Stakeholder's Council (ECI). Both groups had served as leading advocates for young children and their families for several years.

In an effort to work toward a common vision of a comprehensive early care, health, and education system, the Iowa Legislature established Senate File 2088, calling for a merger of Community Empowerment and Early Childhood Iowa into one inclusive structure. These efforts lead to the name change from Community Empowerment to Early Childhood Iowa.

Iowa is committed to achieving results and every community in Iowa has the opportunity to develop the capacity and commitment for achieving these results:

- Healthy Children
- Children Ready to Succeed in School
- Safe and Nurturing Families
- Secure and Nurturing Early Learning Environments
- Safe and Supportive Communities

The Early Childhood Iowa legislation established two specific programs *School Ready* and *Early Childhood*. These programs provide funding to encourage communities to "work together" to assist families with children ages prenatal through age five.

School Ready Grants provide comprehensive services for children prenatal through age five, including early learning environments (preschool and child care), family support and other services. Early Childhood Grants enhance the quality and capacities of child care services.

History of Quad Counties 4 Kids Early Childhood Area

In June 2009 the State Empowerment Board, now known as the State Early Childhood Iowa Board, went through a "lean" event. The purpose of the lean event was to improve efficiencies at the state level, improve efficiencies at the local level, find balances between the local and state level, clarify roles and responsibilities, and improve performance and accountability. In the 2010 legislative session, legislators embraced the lean event recommendations and implemented many of the State Empowerment

recommendations. Merging of Empowerment Boards, now known as Early Childhood Iowa Areas, was one of the new requirements.

The merger conversation among Adams, Ringgold and Union Counties started in early 2010. After numerous conversations it was determined that there were commonalities in the counties that made the merger of the three into a new area a logical next step. On March 29, 2010 a joint meeting of the three boards with 14 in attendance was held in Creston. Steve Adams, ISU Extension, led the group through a SWOT analysis which was very beneficial as the merger process began in earnest. Taylor County had chosen to explore other options at that time.


Three committees were formed with each having assigned tasks. There was equal representation on these committees from the three counties. One Director/Coordinator served as the contact and collector of information for each of the committees. All committees came together on an as needed basis to report progress and gather additional input. In the fall of 2010, the three individual boards chose to delay the merger process until the legislatively mandated date of July 1, 2013. The three committees continued to meet but work was done at a more leisurely pace. All counties were still in agreement on the merge and stayed in contact through their directors.

Taylor County formally requested permission to join with Adams, Ringgold and Union Counties to form a four-county area in the fall of 2011. By December 31, 2011 all three of the individual county boards had voted to accept the Taylor County request to become part of the new area. State ECI Staff was notified that we were ready to move forward. A joint meeting of the boards was convened January 31, 2012 at which time Taylor County accepted the work that had been done previously by the merger committees.

On July 1, 2023, Early Childhood Iowa will become part of the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) as a new organizational structure for state government goes into effect. Government departments and agencies that provide related services or have similar business functions are aligning to better serve Iowans. You can expect the same quality services you get now from Early Childhood Iowa to continue as usual. Our goal is to meet your needs more efficiently and effectively through better coordination as one team.

ECI State Board

The Early Childhood Iowa State Board provides oversight of the ECI Area Boards to provide governance for planning and collaboration of services to support young children and their families. There are currently 38 area boards that cover all of Iowa's 99 counties. The ECI State Board includes citizen members appointed by the Governor, the agency directors (or designees) of the Departments of Education, Economic Development Authority, Human Rights, Health and Human Services, and Workforce Development, and ex-officio legislators.

ECI Local Area Boards

The 38 ECI Area boards are charged to reach the desired results to improve the quality of life for young children and their families at a local level. These local boards consist of citizens, elected officials, and representatives of education, health, human services, faith, business, and consumers and work together with other early childhood partners, including program and service providers and other early childhood funders.


Use of Community Plan:

As outlined in Tool NN, Early Childhood Area community plan template, the Quad Counties 4 Kids Community Plan "is a living, breathing document that guides the work of the local Early Childhood Iowa Area (ECIA) board and community". The plan was written with the assistance of community partners using a needs assessment survey and strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats analysis (SWOT) along with program participant surveys. It is used to assist the Board and community partners to build a strong local early care, health and education system that exists for children ages prenatal through five years within the Quad Counties 4 Kids boundary area. The plan identifies community assets, common needs and gaps in services. The document guides planning and decision making, addresses sustainability and is a tool that can be utilized by the community as a whole.

The populations of all counties peaked in the 1900 census. This is reflective of the immigration boom that took place throughout the country at that time. Iowa overall has had a population increase of 36.9% since 1910. This growth has mostly occurred in metropolitan areas with rural population experiencing declines. Currently only ¼ of total population of Iowa lives in rural counties. Low population areas are dominated by jobs in agriculture with fewer jobs in higher skilled services like finance, insurance and real estate. Counties with the smallest populations in 2022 estimates in Iowa were Adams (3,611) which was the smallest, followed by Ringgold (4,670) ranked second smallest, and Taylor ranked as fourth (5,858). These are three of the four counties making up the Quad Counties Area.

Quad Counties 4 Kids Vision:

"Every child, beginning at birth, will be healthy and successful."

Early Childhood Iowa is tasked with ensuring that our young children are healthy, ready to succeed in school, grow up in safe and supportive communities with secure and nurturing families, and have access to secure and nurturing early learning environments.

All four counties continue to be united in their belief that Quad Counties 4 Kids Area Board ensures that services are provided to children and their families; there is continued collaboration with other community agencies and organizations; and recognized data and assessments are utilized for decision making.

Quad Counties 4 Kids Mission:

We will collaborate as a four-county area to enhance the lives of children 0-5 and their families.

This has been the Board's mission since the merger in FY2013.

All counties in the area continue to have an increase in Hispanic or Latino residents. Taylor County has the largest % of population who fit into this group. Lenox in particular has a larger concentration of Hispanics/Latinos. There are four large employers in Lenox, a food processing plant Michael Foods, Precision Pulley and Idler, Dalton Ag and AgriVision Equipment.

Other Information of Interest

Births

Adams, Ringgold and Union Counties each have a hospital, however Greater Regional Medical Center in Union County is the only hospital that delivers babies. There are no hospitals in Taylor County. Secondary hospital care is received in Clarinda, Iowa (22 miles away, Corning, Iowa (22 miles away), Mt. Ayr, Iowa (28 miles away), Creston, Iowa (50 miles away) and Maryville, Missouri (25 miles away). Tertiary care is a minimum of 110 miles away. Taylor County is designated as a federal medically underserved area while both Taylor and Ringgold are designated as dental shortage areas.

Needs Assessment / Data Analysis

- Secure and nurturing early learning environments.







Infant Mortality by County 2017-2021 (infants younger than 1 year of age per 1,000 births)




Early Literacy Skills by County




Mothers with Less than High School Education






Children in Poverty by County






Children in Families Living Below 200% of Poverty Level






Poverty by County


Total Homeless (Sheltered and Unsheltered)






Inadequate Prenatal Care by County







Births: Teenage Mother I	by County







Births: Unmarried Mothers by County







Births Low Maternal Education by County







Poverty at Birth by County






Prenatal Tobacco Exposure by County









Children with 2 or More Risk Factors







Incidence of Child Abuse by County






Mothers Under 20 by County








Children Present (Harmed and Not Harmed)





Licensed Centers and Preschools



Child Development Homes








High need assessments from the I2D2 data in three or more counties include:

- **Birth Risks:** Percentage of children with 0, 1, 2 or more, or 3 or more risk factors. Note, cumulative risk was calculated by adding risks that were present at the time of child birth, including the following risks: unmarried mother, teenage mother, low maternal education, prenatal tobacco exposure, poverty, inadequate prenatal care, and preterm or low birth weight. This indicator has a maximum possible score of 6 as low maternal education and teenage mother were mutually exclusive.
- **Child Care Center Slot Shortages:** Number of slots (spaces) potentially available for children in DHS licensed centers/preschools or registered child development homes.
- Children in Poverty: Percentage of children, under 6, who live in families with incomes below 100 percent of the U.S. poverty threshold, as defined by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget.
- **Indequate Prenatal Care:** Percentage of children born of mothers who received inadequate prenatal care.
- **Prenatal Tobacco use:** Percentage of children born of mothers who smoke during pregnancy and/or three months prior to becoming pregnant.

Quad Counties ECI area will continue to colaborate with programs and partners to improve and share results with a focus on Safe and Supportive Communities with a focus on Birth Risks, Child Care, Poverty, Prenatal Care and Pregnancy Tobacco use.

After reviewing the county health rankings for 2023, Union County ranks 92 out of 99 for the state with highest health rankings in Length of Life, contributing from poor health behaviors and Social & Economic factors. Taylor Scores next at 64 out of 99 with high rankings in Clinical Care. Ringgold county ranks 58 out of 99 with highest rankings in Quality of Life. All four counties have high rankings in Length of Life and Health behaviors, that can include Adult smoking, Adult obesity, Food environment index, physical inactivity, access to exercise opportunities, Excessive drinking, Alcoholimpaired driving deaths, Sexually transmitted infections, Teen births.

The childcare cost burden among counties in Iowa averages from 14% to 33% of the median income for families. This continues to be a burden for families and child care businesses with the economy. Priority of the Quad Counties area will continue to offering families relief from the cost burden and offer quality childcare and preschool in the area. Quad Counties annual cost of childcare for families is lower than the state average, which causes providers to struggle with the increase in cost of running their businesses.

We will continue to work on providing quality preschool programming in all counties with a focus to promote in Union and Taylor.

Reflecting the cohesiveness of the members, the board found a high number of Internal Strengths. The Internal Weaknesses almost all related to the challenges in childcare. External opportunities offset many of the weaknesses and with the support of the state initiatives around child care, we should continue to see the needle move with these initiatives. External threats revolved around lack of/unstable funding and the unknown of the future of Quad Counties 4 Kids. Challenges continue to face our communities linked to cost of services/low income and lack of available quality child care, lack of mental health resources and resource shortage in our area for families.

Strategies for the Quad Counties 4 Kids Area Board

In the Board's current capacity, for children and families in the area, respectful and well thought out decisions are made to support quality programs. Over the last few years the Board has had the opportunity to become familiar with and evaluate effectiveness of priorities, indicators, programming and outcomes. Although specific strategies were developed to guide the Board in determining that supported programs achieve outcomes that meet the adopted priorities, they also recognized that the process is a learning experience for providers as well as themselves.

Continued conversation occurs with providers to achieve the best possible outcomes and when unable, they are committed to assisting them reach success. On an annual basis, these priorities are reviewed and changes, if any, are included in the Annual Report.

The Quad Counties 4 Kids Area Board has:

- supported quality programing for children and families by assisting providers to reach high quality through meeting required outcome measures;
- moved the system forward through the monitoring process, providers are more aware of accountability and reporting requirements;
- provided information to communities of the identified priorities;
- worked with local partners to promote and increase the new Iowa Quality Rating with "Building Blocks for Quality" incentive program.
- participated on mental health advisor boards and behavior health coalitions.

Quad Counties 4 Kids is committed to moving the early care health and education system forward. During the next several years the Board plans to:

- Review the State ECI Strategic Plan, adjusting our strategies to fit within the state-wide plan as needed.
- Review current programming/services on an annual basis
- Review quarterly reports and information from annual site visits
- Continue to review process to award funding
- Improve communication with the community, providers, and policy makers about gaps and needs
- Continue to enhance Board policies and procedures
- Align with state and local goals for new HHS alignment process

Quad Counties 4 Kids Process for Awarding Funds

Overall funding plan

• Each spring when an approximate amount of available funding is determined by the Quad Counties 4 Kids ECI Area Board, the Board will determine the need for a complete Request for Proposal (RFP) or a Request for Renewal (RFR). If the Board determines that a revision of the RFP is necessary, a committee comprised of Board members convenes to review and recommend for approval of a new/amended RFP/RFR. To assist programs in planning, the board is currently using a three-year funding plan. If the board feels it is necessary, the funding process can be opened.

Process Request for Proposals/Requests for Renewals

- The Board typically releases the Request for Proposal (RFP) as early as possible in March for the following funding year with the intent to allow applications at least 30 days for submission. Electronic notification is distributed widely to all current contract holders and the general public. If the Board determines that an RFP is not necessary, currently funded programs will be asked to submit a request for renewal (RFR).
- The Director will monitor all requests for funding received and convene the appointed committee, comprised of Board members, to evaluate the requests and determine the next steps. This committee meeting is usually planned in lieu of a regular board meeting in April and is open to the public.

Process for Awarding Funding and Evaluating Programs

- The Director will perform a technical assistance review on all applications received. The committee members will receive copies of each proposal. They will be asked to read the proposals, score them, and be prepared for discussion at the scheduled committee meeting. During the meeting they will discuss availability of funding, proposals, narratives and budgets received. Items to be considered when determining funding requests for proposals will be current Quad Counties 4 Kids ECI Area community priorities, level of satisfaction and evaluation of the current contractors, and levels of funding compared to previous year(s). Funding recommendations and analysis will be shared with the full Board at the next regularly scheduled board meeting. Historically this is in May.
- The Quad Counties 4 Kids Area Director will notify all applicants of funding decisions which are pending approvals from Early Childhood Iowa, Health and Human Services.

Appeals Process

Applicants have the right to appeal the funding decisions based upon a showing that the policies and procedures governing the grant selection process have not been properly applied. The appeal process begins on the emailed date of the written notification to the applicant of the board's decision. Appeals should be in writing and filed with the Director within five working days of the date of written notification of funding decisions to the applicant. It is the responsibility of the applicant to assure that appeals are received by 4:30 PM on or before the fifth working day of the appeals process. Appeals received after 4:30 PM on the fifth day will not be reviewed. All appeals shall be delivered to the Area Director who will forward them to the Chairperson of the Board.

- All appeals shall clearly state how the selection failed in following the rules of the grant process as governed by the policies and procedures outlined in the application material provided to all applicants. The request must also describe the remedy sought.
- The Quad Counties 4 Kids Board will review the appeal and gather information regarding any infractions of the process.
- At the next regularly scheduled meeting, or if time is of the essence at a special meeting, the Board will determine if there has been a violation of process and will rule on the appeal.

SECTION 111: FISCAL ASSESSMENT

Process used to gather Information:

Fiscal assessment information for services/agencies in Adams, Ringgold, Taylor and Union Counties was gathered through email, telephone and interagency meetings by director with assistance from Board members in 2019. Every effort is made to complete the fiscal assessment as accurately and completely as possible, but in the small rural four counties of the Quad Counties Area issues always arise. Services/agencies were asked to provide the following information:

- Name of agency/organization
- Completed by
- Date
- Location/city/county
- Type of service provided and program name
- · Ages of children served
- Number of families served
- Yearly estimated funding: Identified by Federal, State Local, Private, Local ECI Area
- Identified gaps in funding

These responses were reviewed and updated for the 2023 community plan by the director and will continue to be updated during contract monitoring in FY2024.

Use of Information

The Board of Directors evaluates the information collected to assist in the decision-making process for distribution of funds. The information gathered achieves the following:

- Awareness of what is offered in the counties other than their own, ultimately allowing for matching Early Childhood Iowa funding with others to get maximum benefit for children and families in the area.
- Familiarize themselves with other funding opportunities in each county that will prevent duplication of services.
- Sustainability for programming could depend on the Early Childhood Iowa funding not be the sole source of funding.
- Recognize and increase the levels of collaboration that exist in each of the counties.
- Sharing of document with other community partners as a tool they can utilize.

SECTION IV: Community Collaboration

Collaborative and Networking Opportunities

During the original merge process in FY2013, the Quad Counties 4 Kids Area Board of Directors came to the table knowing that individually, as well as collectively, they brought knowledge that being small communities, folks wear many hats. They have the opportunity to know each other, and consequently feel a deep responsibility to working with their professional counterparts who may also be their neighbors. The Board continues to understand that it is part of their responsibility to help facilitate collaboration of services for children birth through five and their families. Conversation within the Board itself as well as with their individual community partners indicate that shared goals and resources ultimately result in better service delivery to at-risk children and families. It still stands true, as during the merge that when asked, "how does your organization collaborate in the community", the consensus is "small communities have learned how to work together" because limited funding opportunities drive the need to collaborate and share resources.

A key component to the Quad Counties 4 Kids Area becoming successful is continued communication. Ensuring that their voices are heard during on-going collaborations, every effort is made to include agencies, organizations, and service providers who were unable to respond to resource collection. As all agencies have experienced budgetary cuts and loss of program services or staff, economic conditions make this endeavor even more critical.

The Quad Counties 4 Kids ECI Area keeps abreast of developments through communication with our partners who are members of the Shared Decision-Making Team (Decatorization) and Community Partnerships for Protecting Children. We participate on each county's interagency group meetings and are active in the Prevent Child Abuse Councils, Southern Hills Mental Health region and Behavior Health Collation. Quad Counties 4 Kids ECI Area Director or Board members serve on a host of boards in the area including: school boards, ISU Extension Councils; County boards, and local employer councils. Conversation continues through these involvements giving voice to the priorities of the Quad Counties 4 Kids Early Childhood Area.

The Quad Counties 4 Kids looks forward to more collaborative opportunities as some of our focus changes through active participation in the State ECI Strategic Plan Implementation. The board has begun to broaden our range of contacts as we join with other community agencies and individuals to have conversation about the needs we see in the area. We will also analyze the Needs Assessment information, specific to our area, recently released as a result of the Preschool Development Grant 0-5. This document has been added as an addendum to this plan as a matter of reference for future planning.

SECTION V: Review and Evaluation

Quad Counties 4 Kids Community Plan – Evaluation

The Community Plan is a living, breathing document that tells a complete story of the Quad Counties 4 Kids Area (Adams, Ringgold, Taylor and Union). As such, it is necessary for the plan to be continually evaluated for effectiveness over time. The following steps are in place to ensure this takes place:

- The Community Plan is discussed and reviewed annually for updates to community wide indicator data to monitor trends. At this time priorities are reviewed.
- The board will make changes to the plan as conditions change within the area and new opportunities present themselves.
- All funded programs must address the state required performance measures as stated in the Toolkit on the Early Childhood Iowa website.
- The Director conducts an onsite review to determine if the Contractor is meeting program expectations. The review may include activities as, conducting periodic review of program performance measures, expenditures, and financial records, verification that an individual is eligible for a program based on income eligibility requirements (if applicable).
- The funding process includes a review of the area priorities and indicators as related to funding requests.
- Programs will be required to submit monthly reports along with their reimbursement request (with attached appropriate documentation) and quarterly reports that follow the

format designated by the Director and include at a minimum: demographic data, activities performed, state and local performance outcomes and measures as outlined in the contract. Reporting periods and due dates are outlined in the contract.

- Quarterly program reports will be reviewed by the Director at Board meetings,
- The ECI Area submits a Mid-Year report to the office of Early Childhood Iowa.
- Director shall maintain an up-to-date financial report, submitted for Board approval, which
 includes monthly expenditures for each program and the balance/percentage of allocated
 funds.
- Contractors are required to submit an annual report with required performance measures.
- The Quad Counties 4 Kids Board submits and annual report as required to Early Childhood lowa on or before September 15 of each year.
- The Quad Counties 4 Kids Board will participate in the Early Childhood Iowa's designation process every four years.

Evaluation of Board Functioning

The Quad Counties 4 Kids Board evaluates itself through an annual evaluation using a Survey Monkey document to maintain anonymity. Individuals from the community who are familiar with the Board and funded programs may also be asked to complete the survey. The purpose of the survey is to assess the board function and performance. The information is brought to the board where discussion includes results, areas of concern identified, strengths, and the need for Professional Development on Board functioning.
